Barry Segal has passed, but his legacy remains – a strong advocate for autism and health, he was our sponsor for over 14 years. CHIP International met Barry on a fluke – at a cocktail for Architects for Humanity, and met someone who put us in touch. He invited my sister of CHIP New York and me to his home. We met over brunch, and he decided to donate \$20,000.

Since then, in 2011, Barry of Focus for Autism, which then became Focus for Health, began to sponsor CHIP International annually. Over the years, we would visit Barry in New Jersey from time to time to give an update and fill in the Minutes from the Board, which we sent to him regularly as Honorary Chair. (He used to tell us the meetings were "not his thing".)

Barry was always the gracious host and eager to hear about what we were doing. His questions were direct, with no hidden agenda. I appreciated his character and continued loyalty to our program. He had a gruff kindness that was heartfelt.

May he now rest in tranquility, satisfied with all his efforts to help others in need. Certainly, with CHIP International, we will never forget his generosity.


Awareness Updates

Historic Special Needs Congress

The first-ever Congress for the Inclusion of Children with Special Needs held in Dakar, Senegal in July 2025, took on the challenge of reducing the imbalance in education for children with special needs in the country.

The conference focused on experiences, best practices, programs, and policies for the inclusive education of children with special needs. It also provided a networking platform for individuals and associations involved in the care of children with special needs.

In attendance were the Minister for Education, as well as other government officials, and a cross-section of parents, teachers, advocates, and civil society organizations. The special guest of honour was the first lady of Senegal.



"From Awareness to Action:

Advancing Autism Inclusion"





Autism awareness, acceptance, and action are gaining traction in Africa. CHIP-I was present at GT Bank Ghana's 2025 Autism Workshop and

Consultations program, with over 800 parents, caregivers and teachers. It consisted of a workshop, presentations and panel discussions by specialists in health, education, speech and behavior analysis and management.

The 4-day program also included free oneon-one consultations with over 28 specialists across various disciplines who provided personalized support for parents and caregivers.

One wonderful outcome of the workshop was the news that the governmental Ghana Health Service is finalising a plan to introduce practical, enhanced community-based solutions to support autistic persons by training frontline community health workers to facilitate early intervention for children with autism.





Cultural Autism Studies at Yale

CHIP International's 'Autism in Africa' series with the Cultural Autism Studies at Yale (CASY https://culturalautismstudiesatyale.space) continued in May and June with presentations on 'The Economic Impact of Autism Inclusion in Africa' by Lynn Dadzie-Yeboah, Founder, President, and Board Chair of the Alexis Miranda Foundation in the USA and Ghana; and 'Education for People Living in Autism in Nigeria: Barriers and Community-Driven Solutions' by Mrs. Dotun Akande, the founder and Director of Patrick Speech and Languages Centre in Nigeria.

The series will continue in the Fall semester, with parents and/or practitioners in the field of autism from various countries in Africa. CASY has been a success and is expanding globally, at the forefront of championing a shift in perspectives concerning autism. CHIP International continues to showcase the realities, successes, and possibilities for progress in autism in Africa.

Autism Awareness Care and Training Centre





The Autism Awareness Care and Training Centre (AACT) is the first special needs Centre in Ghana dedicated to individuals with autism. The Centre was founded in 1998 by Mrs. Serwah Quaynor, the mother of an autistic son, Nortey. In the words of 'Auntie Serwah':

"Sometimes it takes what seems to be a misfortune to show us the real blessings in our lives. Having sojourned through the phases of denial through to acceptance of a son's autism and finally being able not only to smile at the progress he has made but be able to reach out to others; to encourage them too to be accepting and seek help; and to reach out to the society at large is nucleus of the story of AACT and Autism in Ghana."

AACT is dedicated to fostering meaningful education and independence for each child.

Nigerian autistic teenager breaks Guinness World Record for

largest art canvas

A Nigerian teenager with autism, Kanyeyachukwu Tagbo-Okeke, has broken the Guinness World Record for the world's largest artwork on canvas.

The painting measures 12,304 square meters, larger than a standard football field. It features a multi-colored ribbon, a symbol for autism, surrounded by emojis, and was created to raise awareness about autism.
